Two COVID-related deaths in the Panhandle reported, Panhandle total deaths 97 Panhandle Vaccine Timeline

Two additional COVID-related deaths in the Panhandle are being reported bringing the total deaths to 97. A Kimball County male in his 90s and a Scotts Bluff County male in his 80s have recently passed.

"We wish to express our sincerest condolences with the friends and loved ones in the loss of our fellow Panhandle residents. We share peace and comfort with you especially during this holiday season," said Kim Engel, Panhandle Public Health District Director.

As the vaccine becomes available mid-December in the Panhandle for specific groups, each phase is broken down as follows:

- Phase 1a: Healthcare personnel: hospitals, home healthcare, pharmacies, EMS, outpatient, public health, dentists, optometrists, and behavioral health
- Phase 1b: First responders, education sector, food/agriculture, utilities, and transportation
- Phase 1c: 65 years of age, vulnerable populations (disabled, homeless) congregate settings (incarcerated, colleges/universities)
- Phase 2: General Population

The vaccine is a critical step to getting life back to normal as possible. Common side effects are pain and swelling on the arm where you got the shot. Throughout the rest of your body: fever, chills, tiredness, and headache are also common.

It's important for everyone to continue using all the tools available to help stop this pandemic as we learn more about how COVID vaccines work in real-world conditions. Cover your mouth and nose with a mask when around others, stay at least 6 feet away from others, avoid crowds, and wash your hands often.

Unified Command confirms 161 more cases of COVID in the Panhandle since last reporting on Thursday, December 10. Recoveries are available on the Panhandle dashboard at <u>www.pphd.org</u>. The investigations are underway, all close contacts will be quarantined.

Avoid the Three Cs:

- Avoid Crowded Places Avoid gathering in groups where you cannot maintain 6feet of distance from others
- Avoid Close Contact Wear a mask over your nose and mouth or maintain 6-feet distance when you are spending more than 15 total minutes with people you don't live with
- Avoid Confined Spaces Avoid enclosed spaces with poor ventilation
